The executors have to apply for a "grant of letters of administration" (equivalent to the "grant of probate above.")

The grant of probate is issued by a court called the Probate Registry and confirms the legal right to manage and distribute the estate according to the deceased's will. If the person died without leaving a will or there are no executors to a will, the process is a little more complicated.
