Whereas Hare is a common trickster of northern, eastern, and southern Africa, the trickster of West Africa is Spider (Ghana, Liberia, Sierra Leone) or Tortoise (the Igbo and Yoruba people of Nigeria). Many African cultures also have tales about human tricksters (e.g., the stories of Yo in Benin).
